



TWO CRITICAL MESSAGES TO USAF

- Restrict all low-level combat training activities to Barry M.
 Goldwater Range where they are already happening
- Stop violating current boundaries and regulations for Combat Training Flights in Tombstone MOA

MOA HISTORY and CURRENT STATUS

Tombstone MOA created in 1976....

Population is 70% bigger today

Economy is far advanced today

Protected Areas Have Increased in size

EFFECTIVE LOCAL RESPONSE

More than 200 Nuisance Flight Reports filed by area residents since USAF Announced its Combat Flight Training Expansion Plan.

WHY MORE NUISANCE REPORTS?

- MORE PEOPLE AFFECTED
- MORE ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES DISRUPTED BY NOISE
- MORE VIOLATIONS OF CURRENT MOA REGULATIONS
- SOUND IS LOUDER IN CANYONS-WHERE PEOPLE LIVE

USAF PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE

More than DOUBLE the current number of Combat Training Fights—to 8,000/yr. (moved from Barry Goldwater Range to Tombstone MOA)

New Combat Training Flights over Portal/Animas (Boundary Expanded)

Combat Training Flights at 100 feet AGL (down from 500 ft. AGL)

Sonic Booms at 5,000 ft. AGL (down From 30,000 ft. AGL)

30,000 Flares dropped yearly from 2,000 feet AGL (down from 5,000 ft. AGL)

7,000 Chaff Bundles dropped annually from 2,000 ft. AGL (Not allowed Now)

DEIS LACK OF TRANSPARENCY

Rerouting existing combat training away from Barry Goldwater Range to Tombstone MOA is intended to allow increase in "more hazardous" operations at BMGR—but what could be more hazardous than combat training at low elevations over Tombstone MOA wilderness and residential areas with flares, chaff and sonic booms?


Rerouting of combat training flights to Tombstone MOA includes thousands of A-10 training missions now being flown at Barry Goldwater Range that will disappear when A-10s are soon retired—opening vast airspace at BMGR for new "more hazardous" operations at Barry Goldwater. No mention as an alternative in the DEIS.

BARRY M. GOLDWATER RANGE


1.9 million acres of undisturbed federal land / 57,000 cubic miles of airspace already used for air-to-air and air-to-ground battlefield training missions



UNACCEPTABLE: Moving hundreds of hazardous flights from this huge, completely unpopulated, federally-controlled airspace to a smaller, heavily-populated Tombstone MOA with highly sensitive economic and biological components.






Location outside of MOA Boundary

DAMAGE FROM "SONIC BOOMS"

F-16 or F-35 at 5,000 feet = 200 decibels
Air Pressure burst can damage structures, injure ears



More than double the OSHA allowable decibels without hearing protection

RELEASE of 7,000 Bundles of CHAFF annually

Countermeasure to confuse enemy radar



NEW PROPOSAL WOULD ALLOW DROP OF CHAFF FROM 2,000 FEET above ground

(Currently: NOT ALLOWED IN TOMBSTONE MOA)



30,000 FLARE-RELEASES ANNUALLY

New Proposal would allow dropping of flares from 2,000' above ground causing Wildfire Danger







SERIOUS CRASH RISKS

"Six F-16s have been involved in accidents in 2023. About three Fighting Falcons have been totaled each year on average for the past decade."

"29 F-35s have crashed since the plane was developed 10 years ago."

THREATS TO WILDLIFE / WILDLANDS

DEIS AIRSPACE COVERS:

140 ESA-Listed plant and animal species 1,234,543 acres of Designated Wilderness 1,956,010 acres of Critical Habitat Designations

Low-level, High-Decibel Training flights can "adversely modify designated critical habitats" for ESA-Listed species—USFWS



DEIS IGNORES IMPACTS

What are the benefits for local residents and communities?

No Tangible Benefits Reported in the just-released DEIS

What are the negatives for local residents and communities?


- Loss of quality of life and safety—"No Significant Impacts"
- Stress on personal health and well-being, loss of privacy
- Reduced R.E. values (disclosures, lost sales, county prop. tax losses).
- Reduction in tourism due to loss of quiet and wildlife in recreation areas
- Disruption of livestock and pet activities due to extreme noise levels.
- Increased risk of wildfires from flares, crashes
- Biodiversity damage from chaff releases
- Damage to structures caused by sonic booms

BOTTOM LINE

The DEIS Preferred Alternative would fundamentally redefine outdoor life across a vast section of Southeast AZ and Southwest NM

YOUR COMMENTS

What is "substantive" and does it matter?

What are the most effective comments to make?

Does this matter if the USAF is ignoring us anyway?

—Likely future actions including lawsuits

Important Comment Ideas

- Adequate alternatives are not provided in the DEIS. Suggest flights stay at Barry M. Goldwater Range.
- Draft EIS is analytically inadequate.
 See the PCS website about chaff, flares, fire risk, wildlife, etc.
- Adequate mitigations are not provided.
 Suggest excluding wilderness areas, national parks, tribal lands
- The USAF DEIS process lacks transparency and accountability. Not adhering to NEPA; lack of public and agency input; ignoring scoping comments; not responding to nuisance flight reports; refusing FOIAs; etc.
- Comment Period Needs to be Extended 60 Days

More time needed to Comply with NEPA

Top-Line Comment Phrases that Matter....

1. Tell the Air Force that expanding military combat training over rural communities and tribal and public lands is not acceptable.

2. The Air Force should restrict its lower elevation and supersonic flights, and other combat training, such as dropping chaff and flares, to the Barry M. Goldwater Range where it's already happening.

3. The Air Force must not shift the burden of risk to rural and tribal communities in southern AZ and NM.
